- Ladies and gentlemen,

Good morning and a very warm welcome to our city of Durban. It is indeed an honor for me as Mayor of Durban to officially open this Research Symposium, where ground breaking partnerships have been formed between eThekwini Municipality and each of the mentioned institutions of higher learning since the historic signing of the latest Memorandum of Agreement in June 2015.

I am really encouraged to see so many of our young researchers, from academia and from our city wanting to make a difference to society by using their research evidence to make the argument. I am hopeful that this is a great start to the much needed policy dialogues in the city and significantly reassuring when our youth are influencing the transformation process.

When we initiated the formation of the first-ever local government-driven, practitioner-based Municipal Institute of Learning (MILE), it was partly in response to our national government's turn-around strategy which sounded the call for municipal collaboration to enhance local government practitioner capacity. As part of our municipality's knowledge management strategy to position Durban as a center of learning.

Durban is indeed a City in Transformation - accelerating economic transformation for inclusive and sustained socio-economic outcomes; strengthening partnerships for improved governance and creating liveable spaces that are safe and secure. Yesterday, we adopted R45billion budget that will be used for service delivery. Part of the budget must be able to create jobs and used to empower black business. We are unapologetic about empowering our black people especially those that are led by youth and women.

We therefore encourage our academic partners to activate their social responsiveness and work alongside us in responding to our developmental agenda. By working together a lot more can be achieved.

As a leading NEPAD City, and an active member of the United Cities and Local Government in Africa, our Municipality has played an important leadership role in the coordination of the learning agenda around strategic planning, sustainable development and urban local governance in cities on the continent.

As a forward thinking City, Durban is one of the few cities in the world to have established its very own institute of learning, eThekwini's Municipal Institute of Learning (MILE), which is steadily establishing itself as a dedicated knowledge management and capacity enhancement vehicle working alongside local practitioners locally and internationally to facilitate the desired outcomes.

In 2013 at the World Congress of the United Cities and Local Governments in Morocco, MILE was nominated to pursue the learning agenda for the entire African continent. So it is very significant that our academic partners work alongside us in ensuring that together, we can support the developmental agenda of our continent.

It is worth noting that in positioning Durban as a learning City, our political and administrative leaders have come to realize the potential value of partnering with the institutions of higher learning and can relate to similar experiences elsewhere of the economic, social and other benefits for cities that work closely with academia.

Similarly, academia have come to appreciate that cities need the ideas, energy and outside view represented by universities, communities, staff and students. Research institutions, as I understand its role, should be in the business of responding to societal challenges, contributing to local solutions identifying innovations for everyday problems. Programs and projects such as this annual research symposia, environment seminars, guest lecture program, integrated learning program, sectoral engagements, agreements and research collaborations should continue to serve as vehicles to achieve the desired partnership outcomes. I am optimistic that, as we work together to foster a sustainable partnerships between academia and this city, we can, in the long term, make tomorrow a better day than today for our residents in Durban, our country and our continent.

Reflecting on the last five years of this strategic partnership, I am deeply encouraged by progress made. This is evidenced in the range of joint programs and collaborative projects that exist between our City's line departments and specific faculties across the partnering institutions, the constructive inputs of academic experts on strategic city projects and the numerous "think tanks" that have been set up — all geared towards

ensuring that evidence based research influence our policy making processes.

Whilst some of these historic relations are now part of established projects, numerous new synergies have given birth to projects over the last five years and relate directly to us jointly finding local solutions to key challenges facing our City.

It is for these reasons that our city leadership has taken a long term and strategic view that our partnership with academia must remain intact, serviceable and well sustained – as we work together towards a common purpose for Vision 2060.

The recent refreshing of our Memorandum of Agreement in 2015 with each of you as our preferred partnering institutions, is an indication of our serious intent to work alongside you to improve the quality of life for all that we serve.
